#### 1. Presentation of the Gifts

- What Happens: Bread and wine are brought to the altar, along with other gifts. Except for the bread and wine, the other gifts should be placed in a suitable location away from the Eucharistic table. Members of the congregation bring forward the gifts of bread and wine, which are received by the priest or deacon. As we place these gifts on the altar, we are also invited to offer our own personal gifts, struggles, and intentions. Once again, we should take a moment to reflect on the things in our lives that we want to offer to the table of the Lord and ask for sanctification.
- Why We Do It: This bread and wine symbolizes the offering of ourselves, our work, and our lives to God. The bread and wine will become the Body and Blood of Christ.

# 2. Preparation of the Altar

- What Happens: The altar is prepared for the Eucharistic Prayer. The priest or deacon arranges the corporal, purificator, chalice, and Missal on the altar.
- Why We Do It: Preparing the altar is a practical necessity, but it also signifies readiness for the sacred action of the Eucharist.

#### ➤ Mixing of Water and Wine

- What Happens: The priest adds a drop of water to the wine, saying quietly, "By the mystery of this water and wine, may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled himself to share in our humanity."
- Why We Do It: The water and wine symbolize the union of Christ's divinity and humanity. It also reminds us of the water and blood that flowed from Christ's side on the cross.

# 3. Washing of Hands

- What Happens: The priest washes his hands at the side of the altar and quietly prays, "Lord, wash away my iniquity and cleanse me from my sin."
- Why We Do It: This ritual signifies the priest's need for inner purification before handling the sacred mysteries of the Eucharist.

# **SEASON OF CREATION**

In 2015 Pope Francis published <u>Laudato Si</u>, an encyclical letter calling us to **listen to the cry of the Earth and the cry of the poor**, followed by the <u>Laudate Deum</u> Apostolic exhortation last year.

Every year from the 1st of September to the 4th of October, he encourage us to celebrate the Season of Creation in communion with other Christian churches.

Every week during that month we encourage you to reflect on a quote from Pope Francis and take action.

#### 8th September (23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time)

#### Season of Creation Social Justice Week 8-14 Sept

"The reality is that a low, richer percentage of the planet contaminates more than the poorest 50% of the total world population, and that per capita emissions of the richer countries are much greater than those of the poorer ones." (# 9 Laudate Deum)

Action – There is more carbon dioxide in the atmosphere than ever previously recorded, new data from a New Zealand monitoring station shows. Consider our Pacific neighbours facing sea

level rise. How might we advocate for them? Read about the Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty and act by signing the Faith Letter as an individual.



**REVIEW OF END OF LIFE CHOICE ACT:** The End of Life Choice Act 2019 is the law that makes assisted dying legal in New Zealand. The Act came into force on 7 November 2021. Under the legislation, the Ministry of Health must undertake a review of the operation of the Act within 3 years of it coming into force. Public consultation for feedback on the End of Life Choice Act is now open.

We all have an opportunity to let our voices be heard by making a submission. For more information and submission details, please go to the Ministry of Health website – www.health.govt.nz and scroll down to "Have your say on the End of Life Choice Act" and follow the instructions on how to make a submission. The closing date for submissions is 5.00pm, Thursday 26 September 2024.

When we enter the church, we should leave our desire for efficiency and entertainment at the door. We are not at Mass for ourselves but for God, to give him glory and to show him our love. We should be ready to slow down and adjust our expectations to focus on God more than ourselves. Mass does not have to conclude in less than an hour. We do not have to feel involved outwardly so long as we receive the Word and unite ourselves to Jesus's sacrifice to the Father, as this forms the heart of participation. We should never expect to receive the Lord on our terms, but should surrender to his expectations. Communion is a gift that requires humility and preparation (particularly through Confession) and should be consciously accepted in love.



Mass at Bell Block Catholic Centre on Sunday, 1 September was a time of celebration – it was the first day of Spring, it was Paula Meafua's First Holy Communion, it was Father' Day and three members of the community celebrated their birthdays.

During Mass, Paul Bouterey and Stan Dravitzki, representing fathers in our community, took the offertory gifts to the altar. Frances Butler, the Bell Block community matriarch, prayed a Fathers' Day prayer, which included a prayer for our Pope, our bishop and our priests.

Alofa Meafua took her daughter, Paula, to the altar to receive her First Communion while the congregation sang a Samoan hymn, Sakalameta, translated, O Lord, I am not worthy that You should come to me.

At the end of Mass, Fr Trung presented Paula Meafua with her First Communion certificate and Marie Key presented

her with a card and gift from our community.







Sue Mace acknowledged Frances Butler, Paula Meafua Meads and Ivan McCracken, (who celebrated birthdays at the weekend), for the great contribution they make to the Bell Block community. Frances Butler, a founding member of the community helped Fr Wally Cooke to establish the Bell Block Catholic Centre in 1981. Here she is, 43 years later celebrating her 92nd birthday today. A bonus for Frances was to have her friend, Mary Quin, who turned 95 two weeks ago, with her at Mass today. Paula Meafua Meads was one the first Samoan families to settle in the Bell Block community in the early 1990s. Ivan McCracken, a more recent member, is the handyman and often unseen helper in the community.

Soup, buns and savouries were served for morn-



ing tea with special children's food, which included chocoate, to conclude the special community celebration.
